

HONOR LOUIS WINDMULLER.

Members of the Reform Club Praise His Long Services.

The members of the Reform Club, of which the late Louis Windmuller had been treasurer for twenty-four years, met yesterday in the club rooms in South William Street and adopted resolutions praising their former associate for his work as a philanthropist and reformer. They pledged themselves, so far as possible, to "meet the questions of the day with the same singleness of devotion, self-abnegation and sincerity of purpose exhibited by our late associate."

The resolutions referred to Mr. Windmuller as "unstinting and unselfish in his services to the Reform Club," and "a foreigner by birth who represented the highest ideals of American citizenship."

The six speakers who recalled memories of the late philanthropist were Everett P. Wheeler, the oldest living ex-president of the club; Henry de Forest Baldwin; Calvin Tomkins, ex-Commissioner of Docks and Ferries; John G. Agar, former president of the Club; Bert Hanson and Frederick W. Hinrichs.
